

### Invitation

- This is an invitation to take part in PLORAS.
- PLORAS is a stroke research study.




#### The PLORAS Team want to:

- include you because your stroke has affected your speaking
- look at your hospital brain scan
- monitor your speech and language recovery.



## Study background

- Language is an essential human skill.
- We use language to share needs, ideas, knowledge, feelings and humour.



- Aphasia is a language disorder.
- A stroke can cause aphasia.
- Aphasia can affect speaking, understanding, reading and writing.



Patients and their family want to know:

"how much will I recover?"

"how long will it take?"

- Currently, no one has the answers.
- Aphasia recovery varies from patient to patient.



#### There is **not enough information** about **links** between:

- where the stroke is in the brain
- speech and language skills.
- the time and amount of recovery.



## **PLORAS** goals

- PLORAS aims to:
  - collect the information needed
  - tell future patients about their likely speech and language recovery.
- The information will help patients to plan their future.
- The information will help patients and therapists plan treatment.



## What do PLORAS participants do?



### In hospital/clinic

#### 1. Sign a consent form

You **confirm** that you:

- understand this information booklet
- agree to take part in the study
- are happy to share with the PLORAS Team:
  - brain scans
  - speech and language therapy records
  - relevant medical records.



#### 2. Complete a participant interview

- A researcher will ask you questions.
- The questions ask how the stroke affected you.
- The interview takes about **30 minutes**.



The researcher will complete all questionnaires and forms with you.




A friend or family member may be able to help you answer the questions.



For participants who self-refer to PLORAS: Forms will be done with you by the PLORAS Team, not in hospital.



- Answer some questionnaires.
- We have listed them in order of priority for us (in case you do not want to do all of them).



#### 1. Communication Recovery Measure

- This asks about how the stroke affected your speaking, understanding, reading and writing.
- The questionnaire takes about 20-45 minutes.
- This is essential for you to be included in the study.



#### 2. 'About You'

- This asks about your vision and hearing, hand and foot dominance, education, work, ethnicity, sex and gender, dyslexia.
- The questionnaire takes about 10 minutes.



#### 3. Language Practice Questionnaire

- This asks about any speech and language therapy you have had.
- It also asks about your everyday use of language.
- The questionnaire takes about 20-45 minutes.



#### 4. Your language history


This asks about:

- any other languages you speak
- how the languages were affected by the stroke
- The questionnaire takes about 20-45 minutes.



#### The **PLORAS Team may**:

- invite you to do other speech and language assessments. For example:
  - pointing to pictures, naming pictures,
     reading and writing (60-90 minutes)
  - rating how aphasia affects your life (20-30 minutes).



#### The **PLORAS Team** will:

- contact you every 3 to 6 months to repeat the:
  - Communication Recovery Measure
  - Language Practice Questionnaire



3 - 6 months

#### The **PLORAS Team** will:

 ask your speech and language therapist to complete a questionnaire about your therapy.





- All questionnaires and assessments can be done on a computer / another device.
- You can communicate with the PLORAS Team via video link.
- Participants who do not have access to a computer may:
  - use paper forms
  - have a **home visit**.
- All appointments will be arranged at a time to suit you.







#### Other activities

#### The **PLORAS Team may**:

- invite you to take part in other events and activities. For example:
  - study meetings
  - therapy studies
  - developing training resources
  - public engagement activities.






#### The **PLORAS Team may**:

- invite you to have a functional MRI brain scan
- this involves doing language tasks inside the scanner
- the scan would be at the research centre in London.

This may happen if the PLORAS Team:

- cannot access or use your hospital brain scan
- want to understand how your brain has helped your speech and language recovery.



#### **Benefits**

- The PLORAS Team will monitor your speech and language recovery.
- The PLORAS Team may be able to offer you a prediction for your recovery.
- You will be helping future stroke survivors.



#### **Risks**

- There are no risks to taking part.
- Some participants may be uncomfortable discussing their stroke.
- You do not need to answer if you do not want to.



## **Important!**

- Taking part is voluntary you can stop, have a break or withdraw at any time.
- PLORAS will keep storing and using your data.
- You can withdraw consent for processing your data at any time.



- The PLORAS Team do not provide treatment.
- The PLORAS Team can provide information to help you find treatment.
- Taking part does not affect your clinical care.



## Other questions


#### How long will I be involved in the study?

The PLORAS Team will **contact you until**:

- your language difficulties recover
- you no longer wish to take part
- funding is not renewed.

#### How long will the study last?

- PLORAS will include hundreds of stroke survivors.
- PLORAS will collect data for many years.







#### Will my information be kept confidential?

#### Yes

- Your information will be stored electronically in the PLORAS database.
- Data is encrypted where appropriate.
- Paper data will be stored in a locked cabinet at the research centre or archived at the UCL Records Office.
- Access to the PLORAS database and cabinets is controlled by the Chief Investigator.

## What if the participant cannot understand the study information or complete the forms?

- The participant can identify a consultee.
- The consultee advises what the participant's wishes and feelings would be if they could consent themselves.

The consultee will be asked to:


- 1. read and sign a consultee declaration
- 2. assist the participant with study activities
- 3. raise any **concerns** or if they think the participant should be **withdrawn**.





#### What will happen to the results of the study?

- Final results will be:
  - used to help predict recovery for future stroke survivors
  - available via the PLORAS newsletter and website
  - published in scientific journals.
- The publication stage could take years.
- Publications do not contain details that could identify participants.
